

### **Greater Dublin Pulse - Overview**

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# Where is the priority area overall?



#### **Dublin**

- June is all about Mobility for Dubliners, with the #VeloCity2019 event dominating. Comments are very positive and spark a wider conversation (#Allocate4Cycling) or e-vehicles as an alternative (#SmartMobilityHub, #ClimatePlan2019).
- The signs banning cyclists from Millennium footbridge received negative comments, but citizens proactively propose solutions: shared use as Samuel Beckett or partitioned as Trondheim.

## Fingal

- Utilities has also increased this month, due to planned outages. Messages are not so much complaints, but informative, led by @Fingalcoco.
- Infrastructure is the highest among the regions, mostly due to complaints about lack of proper cycling and rail investments: "They keep re-releasing press releases promising shiney new carriages 5-20 years away. The crisis is here, today".

#### Dún Laoghaire

- Utilities has a staggering 19% in June, compared to only 1% in May. The reason: the swimming bans at Sandycove and others due to the discharge of wastewater.
- Citizens comment both on the sewage overflow and orange algae bloom, some confused and others trying to give answers: "this particular one isn't toxic to humans, (Noctiluca scintillans) and fish just avoid it".

#### South Dublin


- Community and Culture has the highest volume due to a variety of events: The Great Rope of Tallaght or #Tallafest.
- Housing is also the highest for all four areas, due to a discussion over the co-living development not getting planning permission. Most citizens show they are upset and some suggest public housing as a solution.

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# How do they feel about it?





Comments are positive across the board. Tourists are impressed and locals show pride in their city and complain when the necessary infrastructure or maintenance is not in place for tourists to fully enjoy the city: "I suggest removing the railings from the Custom House. The green space should be open to the city's residents and tourists."

# Education

### Housing

Citizens of Dublin are expressing their support for public initiative and funding of both education (#FundOurSchools, #ReduceClassSize) and housing (#HousingCrisis): "#Budget2020 must support primary education [...] leadership positions within schools are critical. The Government must #SupportLeadership and #InvestForTheBest!"

#### Social Inclusion

 Comments with negative sentiment in this category have to do with the topic of racism, although they are mostly anti-racist comments. Public shaming of young anti-immigrant activists and a piece on The New Yorker about 'Ireland's Strange, Cruel System for Asylum Seekers' are the most popular topics.


### Poverty & Homelessness

Two main stories or events dictate the dominantly-negative conversation this month: major homeless hostel in the city center is closing down, and some shocking images of homeless people queing up: "Almost 500 people and 15 kids were pictured lining up at the city centre soup kitchen". This topic touches with the housing crisis, both make citizens extremely upset.

# Top 10 moments

- Housing, June 4<sup>th</sup>, Dublin Dublin City Council's first affordable housing scheme in more than a decade is welcomed by citizens, in need of a solution for the housing crisis.
- Community & Culture, June 5<sup>th</sup>, Dublin The City Council voted unanimously to fly the Pride flag. Online comments skyrocket in joy and recognition..
- Mobility, June 6<sup>th</sup>, Dublin The #VC19 event has expanded to other mobility issues: "Transit oriented development is the gold standard in sustainable urban planning. [...] Great to see a Government body calling for exactly that"
- Utilities, June 12<sup>th</sup>, Fingal @Fingalcoco does a great work of informing about burst watermain in Lusk and the associated outages.
- Housing, June 16<sup>th</sup>, Dublin Upset reactions from citizens to government denying UN's claim that housing in Ireland is unaffordable: "It's time the Government climbed down from that high ladder put their feet on the ground and faced up to a GE. Let the people decide."

- Environment, June 17<sup>th</sup>, Dublin High anticipation to the launching of the Government Climate Action Plan. Comments receive it with moderate optimism.
- Mobility, June 19<sup>th</sup>, Dublin A polemic about Millennium footbridge banning cyclists generates a dense cluster of conversation around.
- Community & Culture, June 20th, South Dublin -Tallafest promotions and a charity soccer match has South Dublin talking about its community.
- Housing, June 24<sup>th</sup>, South Dublin Again, the housing crisis is a big topic, with mostly negative sentiment. This is the case for this day, in which the development of more than 200 co-living units in #Tallaght has been refused planning permission.
- Utilities, June 25<sup>th</sup>, Dún Laoghaire Warnings about the state of seawater come together with informative messages and complaints: "Please do not swim in the sea today anywhere from Seapoint to Killiney. We need: 1) same day water quality testing, 2) pre-emptive warnings following heavy rain, 3) sewage system upgrades @dlrcc"
